Question 1

Write a composition (in approximately 400 - 450 words) on **any one** of the following [20] subjects:

(You are reminded that you will be rewarded for orderly and coherent presentation of matter, use of appropriate style and general accuracy of spelling, punctuation and grammar.)

In this question the marks can be divided into 12 (content) and 8 (expression).

(i) During summer vacation, you had been to a sea beach where you went for scuba diving. Give a detailed description of what you saw, heard and felt during the diving expedition. Also, give an account of your overall experience.

Content- saw (3), heard (3), felt(3), experience (3).

(ii) You had gone for a walk and lost your way in a foreign land. As you didn't know the language, you could not read the signboards. Narrate how you found your way back.

Should be a first hand account and age appropriate.

(iii) Elections are never the true index of the desires of the masses. Express your views either **FOR** or **AGAINST** the statement.

Establish the stance at the beginning. At least four points to be given to justify the argument.

(iv) Empathy.

Should have one single thread of thought, arranged in sequence.

- (c) "I found him a good deal changed." State any two evidences from the story [2] that substantiate the change in Lord Murchison.

Lord Murchison looked anxious and puzzled, and seemed to be in doubt about something. The narrator felt it could not be modern scepticism, for Murchison was the stoutest of Tories, and believed in the Pentateuch as firmly as he believed in the House of Peers. His frankness was no more present as is evident in his reluctance to reveal the identity of the woman in the photograph.

- (iii) Summarise the description and the narrator's interpretation of the woman's [8] photograph. You are required to write the summary in the form of a connected passage in about 100 words. Failure to keep within the word limit will be penalised.
 - She was tall and slight, and strangely picturesque with her large vague eves and loosened hair.
 - She looked like a clairvoyant, and was wrapped in rich furs.
 - It seemed to the narrator the face of someone who had a secret, but whether that secret was good or evil he could not say.
